Inspectors must be at least 14 years of age.

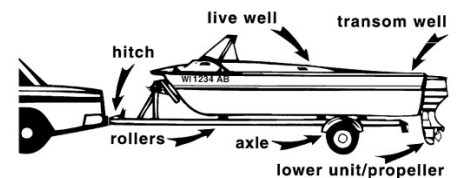
You will not be expected to work a whole day or all weekends/holidays.

## Chemical Treatment (2026) Plan

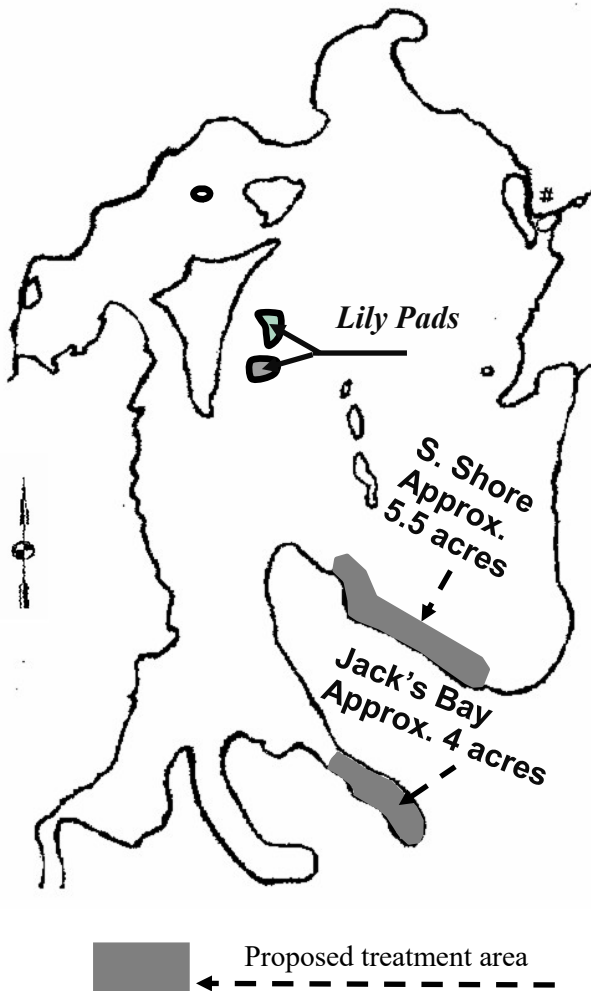

Results in Jack's Bay (May 2025) were encouraging initially, but towards the end of summer Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM) started growing again. So this spring, approximately mid April (weather permitting and active plant growth) we will use ProcellaCor (5pd units) in Jack's Bay and along South Shore (see lake map below). Again this year we are working with Schmidt's Aquatics, LLC. Signs will be posted 2-3 days prior to a Monday/Tuesday treatment.

Footnote: Since EWM spreads by fragmentation, it may help if you reverse your motor before going into Jack's Bay or South Shore.



## Dam Failure Analysis Update

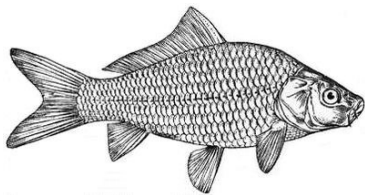


In 2025 Greif and Associates conducted a "Dam Failure Analysis" on our two dam structures for Eagle Spring Lake. A major unexpected result of the DFA is that our dams were changed from "Significant" hazard to "High" hazard after the DNR reviewed it. The two water control structures now need to pass a 1000-year flood event without overtopping by law instead of a 500-year event. This would require us to expand our current spillway capacity from approximately 550 cubic feet per second (cfs) to 2300 cfs at flood stage per DNR. This is no small undertaking and has brought great risk of large, unexpected cost to achieve. The 2,300 cfs is estimated through a simulation conducted by the Flood Insurance Study or (FEMA) conducted in 2023. The DNR uses this information to assess risk involved with dam failure.

I have invested significant time studying all previous flow analysis from 1967 to present day and determined that the 2300 cfs number is a rough estimate based on gross uncalibrated computer simulations. Using the knowledge gained from past studies, the lake association has made a credible case to the DNR that the 1000-year flood event peak flow of 2,300 cfs through our dam estimated by the FIS is extremely conservative and likely excessive based on actual storm flow data measured downstream of our lake at the dam in Mukwonago which has a peak historical flow measurement of ~470 cfs which not only our lake drains through but Lake Beulah, Jerico Creek, and the Phantom Lake Marsh/Lake Basin system. Our lake drains 21 square miles compared to 71 square miles at the Mukwonago Dam. Based on this analysis, the 2,300 cfs number seems excessive. The board has requested to fund a 5 year study period to the DNR to measure and analyze actual storm event data at our dams which will be used to create a more accurate estimate of the 1000 year flood event for our lake. The results of our study, if accepted by FEMA would be used as the design criteria to define the required spillway capacity, we require to safely pass that peak 1000 year storm flow. We would then have 5 years to modify the dams to that spillway capacity. The DNR has accepted this approach and we now owe them a detailed proposal for carrying out the study. We are now putting a plan together to measure flow out of our lake.

## Eagle Spring Lake Carp Control Program

The 2022 carp count on Eagle Spring Lake was 329 (including 146 obtained by DNR electrofishing surveys), for a fourteen-year total of 4737.

The last harvested tagged carp was on October 27, 2022 by Jim Wallis. His first harvested tagged carp was on November 15, 2015, in both cases, he received \$1000. Any other tagged carp turned in after the first of the year will be worth \$500. We are expecting two more carp to be tagged this spring (2026).

The public launch dumpster was considered a nuisance by the DNR and with support of several Lake Management Board members it was removed in October 2022. As a result, it is no longer available for carp disposal. My conservative estimate of the carp catch was based primarily on what I saw in the dumpster during the spring and summer of each year.

In January of 2023, we received some data from Ben Heussner (DNR fisheries' biologist). In 2008, he determined a density of carp in Eagle Spring Lake of 75.9 carp/acre. In 2022, his estimate was 20.9 carp/acre, which was a significant decrease. This data was based on electrofishing. This reduction is consistent with comments from carp fishermen, less spawning activity, as well as less carp activity in general. The spawning activity is +/- Mother's Day week.

The carp program has been criticized for being expensive (cost/carp), as well as the offensive odor from the dumpster and late night noise/light issues. In my opinion, the focus has been to do away with the program rather than to discuss remedial options to the problems.

To be blunt, the carp control program is on life support, primarily because we no longer have a dumpster. If you harvest a carp, bag them to minimize the odor issue and put the bag in your garbage every week. If that doesn't work for you, or you don't live on the lake and you have harvested one or more carp, call Tom Day who will meet you and provide bags and put them in his garbage.

The Eagle Spring Lake Preservation Group (separate from the Eagle Spring Lake Mgmt. District) predominantly funds the carp control program.

Some time prior to 1990 the Eagle Spring Lake Preservation Group came into being. Their mis-

sion was to raise funds for improvement of water quality in the watershed for all of us and future generations. The group included five still on the lake: Janet and Jeff Prokop, Julie and John Mann and myself, Tom Day.

Also, Arlene Zajdel, Candace and Bob Knueppel, Heather and Nate Cobb and Jackie Crivello (all having moved off the lake) as well as Gil Zajdel, Jeri and Bob Posekany, Frank Ekstein, and Joan and Jim Pasterski who have left us.

The group received donations in excess of \$3,000 and with that "seed" money held a spring "carp out" day from 1990 thru 2001. The purpose of these carp out days was to raise money and focus attention on the invasive carp in both Eagle Spring Lake and Lake Lulu. These days were held at the Eagle Spring Lake Pub and public launch. There were raffles, a silent auction, food sales, beverages and prizes for various carp categories (most caught, largest, smallest, etc....). During those twelve carp outs, 849 carp were removed from the lakes and over \$50,000 was raised.

Following 2001, the group took a break. We were exhausted from our efforts. A less labor-intensive carp control effort was implemented in order to tag carp and offer a cash reward if they were harvested (\$1,000 for the first tagged carp in any given year and \$500 for any other tagged carp in that year). To this date, five tagged carp have been turned in and \$4,500 was paid out. A total of 40 carp were tagged between 2009-2022.

The following is a partial list of where the money went:

- Sediment testing and related costs for the two dredging projects: \$14,600
- Donations to fireworks on Eagle Spring Lake: \$1,400
- Fish stocking: \$8,000
- Two lake temperature recorders: \$520
- Weevil project in 1998: \$4,790
- Watershed study: \$11,609
- Protection plan: \$4,000

There remains slightly more than \$7,000 in the Preservation Group account. Continued efforts to control carp and/or updating the watershed nutrient study are being considered.

When out carp fishing, remember that late night noise and light on the water as well as at the public boat launch are a concern for lake residents.

## Lake Patrol - Safety #1 Priority

Again this Spring's Newsletter contains a separate page (pages 5 & 6) for the Town ordinance pertaining to regulations on Eagle Spring Lake. You are encouraged to become familiar with the ordinance (particularly Section 12.02) and **please advise friends, relatives, and renters using our lake** of the "local" regulations. Please observe Ski Channel route - wide turn into channel and "hug" island side to maintain legal distance from pier on main shore.

- ◆ Many times friends or relatives of lake residents are stopped by the Lake Patrol because they're not familiar with the regulations, i.e., **slow-no-wake hours-areas, traffic patterns, life preserver/cushion requirements, and that the certificate of registration must be on all motor boats when in operation.**
- ◆ The "100 foot rule" also applies to those being towed, i.e., skiers, tubers, etc.
- ◆ A frequent complaint **from boaters** is operating too fast in the access channel to Lake Lulu.
- ◆ The Lake Patrol will stop you **only** if they see something that is wrong, for example, an expired boat registration sticker. You generally receive these in March or April. Once stopped they have the right and generally will check for safety violations, etc. The DNR can randomly stop and go through a check.
- ◆ Your attitude may make the difference as to whether you get a warning or a citation (Be cooperative, polite, and honest!).
- ◆ **Who May Operate/Age Restrictions** - It is illegal for a parent or guardian operate a vessel in violation of the requirements below.



A person born before January 1, 1989, is exempt from the safety course requirement. Motorboats (Other than a Personal Watercraft) -

**A person younger than 10 years may not operate a motorboat.**

**A person 10 or 11 years old may operate a motorboat only if** accompanied by a parent, a guardian, or a person at least 18 years old who is designated by the parent or guardian and the parent, guardian, or designated adult holds a valid boating safety certificate or was born before January 1, 1989.

**A person 12-15 years old may operate a motorboat only if he or she:**

Is accompanied by a parent, a guardian, or a designated adult and the parent, guardian, or

designated adult holds a valid boating safety certificate or was born before January 1, 1989, or has completed a boating safety course that is accepted by the Wisconsin DNR.

**A person who was born on or after January 1, 1989, and who is 16 years of age or older** may operate a motorboat only if he or she has completed a boating safety course accepted by Wisconsin DNR or is accompanied by another person in the motorboat who is at least 18 years of age and that person holds a valid boating safety certificate or was born before January 1, 1989.

**Safety certificate must be carried when operating a motor boat or PWC, no matter what adult, parent, guardian, etc. is aboard the same boat or PWC.**

- ◆ Also of importance, Wisconsin Statutes prohibit launching a boat, boat trailer, or boating equipment if there are any aquatic plants or zebra mussels attached.

Hopefully these brief comments will encourage you to spend a few valuable minutes reviewing the ordinances prior to enjoying a safe summer of recreational activities on our lake.

Limit 10

(Eagle Spring and Lulu Combined)



### Largemouth Bass

Protected slot size - Limit 5

(Eagle Spring and Lulu Combined)

Protected size - 14" - 18" (release)

Allowable keeping size - minimum up to 14" and over 18" are legal to keep,

but only one of the five can be over 18".

### Northern Pike

Minimum length of 32" - Limit 1

**Northern Pike need to be a minimum of 32" to keep.**

## Ordinances

In 2015, the following 3 ordinances (15-03, 15-04, & 15-05) have either been amended or added to the Town's Ordinances for our lake.

Ordinance 15-03 was amended and the 3 changes are put in bold print for your convenience (12.02-9, 12.02-10, 12.02-12 & 12.05). Ordinances 15-04 & 15.05 are new and we advise that you read them over in their entirety.

### TOWN OF EAGLE - WAUKESHA COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 15.03 - AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AND RECREATE ORDINANCE 09-02 - AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR SAFETY AND WELFARE ON AND AROUND EAGLE SPRING LAKE

The Town Board of the Town of Eagle repeals and recreates Chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances containing regulations and procedures for enforcement effective on, in and around Eagle Spring Lake:

#### 12.01 STATUTORY PROVISIONS INCORPORATED

State boating laws as found in Secs. 30.50 to 30.71, and 30.99 Statutes, as amended from time to time, are adopted by reference.

#### 12.02 ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS

1. No person shall swim more than 100 feet from shore without being accompanied by an escort boat.
2. No person shall water ski or surf board from 7:30 p.m. or sunset, whichever is sooner, until 8:30 a.m., the following day.
3. No person shall tow more than three persons at one time whether on skis or surf board and not more than three persons at one time shall be towed behind one boat.
4. No person shall operate a motorboat or watercraft in excess of slow-no-wake between 7:30 p.m. or sunset, whichever is earlier, and sunrise the following day or 8:30 a.m., whichever is later. "Slow-no-wake" means - that speed at which a boat moves as slowly as possible while still maintaining steerage control.
5. All piers and rafts shall be marked by red reflectors of not less than 3 inches in diameter placed not more than 3 feet from the outer limits of any pier.
6. No person shall tow or be towed behind a motorboat unless the person being towed is wearing a life jacket approved by U.S.C.G.
7. Interference with markers prohibited. No person shall, without authority, remove, damage, destroy, moor, or attach any watercraft to any buoy, beacon or marker placed in or on Eagle Spring Lake by the authority of the State of Wisconsin, or the Town of Eagle.
8. No person shall throw or deposit any metal cans, glass bottles, wood, paper or other litter or debris in or on Eagle Spring Lake or the surrounding shoreline.
9. No person shall operate a motor vehicle, defined as every motorized device weighing in excess of **1,500 lbs.**, upon icebound Eagle Spring Lake, except for the exclusive purpose of shoreline or lake property maintenance or repair.
10. No person shall drive a **motorized vehicle, includ-**

**ing a snowmobile** recklessly or imprudently on the ice.

11. No person shall operate a motor boat or personal water craft in a clockwise direction around the lake during skiing hours.
12. No person shall obstruct the channel or channel access during skiing hours. The channel is the area between **Travers** Island and Tuohy's Resort.
13. No person shall operate a motor boat or water craft of any kind with a speed exceeding that which is reasonable and prudent with regard to the conditions. In addition, a maximum speed limit of 50mph has been established for Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays.

#### 12.03 RISK AND LIABILITY

All traffic on the ice bound waters of the lake shall be at the risk of the traveler as set forth in §30.81(3) Statutes. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as rendering the enacting authority liable for any accident to those engaged in permitted traffic while this chapter is in effect.

#### 12.04 SPECIFIC AREAS DESIGNATED

The areas shown on the attached map incorporated by reference marked by buoys are designated as areas reserved for that activity at that speed and none other:

Slow-no-wake boating:	S	Swimming:	W
Navigation:	N	In:	I
Out:	O		

#### 12.05 BUOY PLACEMENT

The Lake Management District shall be responsible for placing, maintaining and removing authorized buoys. The buoys shall consist of those shown on the attached map incorporated by reference. **See Buoy Map 2015.**

#### 12.06 PENALTIES

##### **A. STATE BOATING AND WATER SAFETY LAWS.**

Wisconsin boating penalties as found in s. 30.80, Wis. Stats., and deposits as established in the Uniform Deposit and Bail Schedule are hereby adopted by reference with all references to fines are amended to forfeitures and all references to imprisonment are deleted.

##### **B. LOCAL BOATING LAWS. GENERAL PROVISIONS.**

Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance which is not an adopted state statute shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$50.00 for the first offense within a year and not less than \$50 nor more than \$100 for any subsequent violations within the year. Each motor vehicle violation shall carry a forfeiture of a minimum of \$50 to a maximum of \$1,000 plus assessments and costs as allowed by law. Failure to pay the forfeiture shall subject the violator to up to ninety (90) days in the county jail. The violator shall pay, in addition to the forfeiture, court costs, jail assessment and pen-

alty assessments imposed by law. Each day a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

### **C. DEPOSITS REQUIRED.**

1. For all offenses listed in the Uniform Wisconsin Deposit and Bail Schedule for Conservation, Boating, Snowmobile and ATV Violations, the arresting officer shall require the alleged offender to deposit the amount set forth in the schedule **SCHEDULED DEPOSIT.**

#### **a. NON-SCHEDULED DEPOSIT.**

If a deposit schedule has not been established for a specific violation, the arresting officer shall require the alleged offender to deposit the maximum forfeiture permitted by this ordinance plus the penalty assessment, jail assessment fee and court costs, as amended from time to time.

2. If you have been issued a Citation by a Town of Eagle Lake Patrol Officer, you have these choices to handle this Citation:

A. **PAY** the fine amount on the Citation. You may mail your payment to the Joint Municipal court System or pay the fine at the Joint Municipal Court System before the Court Date.

B. **APPEAR** in court on the Court Date if you wish a Trial.

**MUST APPEAR** in Court if the Citation is marked "Must Appear". If you do not appear in Court an Arrest Warrant or Driver's License Suspension may be ordered by the Judge.

### **12.07 ENFORCEMENT**

#### **A. ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURE**

§§66.14.114, 66.115, 66.119 and 66.12, Wis. Stats. as amended from time to time are adopted and by reference made a part of this Ordinance as if fully set forth herein. Any act required to be performed or prohibited by any statute incorporated by reference is required or prohibited by Ordinance. The Town of Eagle elects to use the citation method of enforcement.

#### **B. ISSUANCE OF CITATIONS**

All sections of this Ordinance shall be enforced by the Lake Patrol Officer or the Town Board's appointed representatives.

### **12.08 OTHER REMEDIES**

Neither this ordinance nor the issuance of a citation shall preclude the Town Board or any Authorized officer from other proceedings.

Enacted this 15th day of April, 2015, on motion of Supervisor Rasmussen, Seconded by Supervisor Malek.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 15-04**

#### **AN ORDINANCE THAT PROVIDES FOR DESIGNATING THE ENTIRE EAGLE SPRING LAKE WATER BODY TO BE SLOW-NO-WAKE**

The Town Board of the Town of Eagle enacts this ordinance that authorizes the Eagle Spring Lake Management District's Chairperson, or acting Chairperson to temporarily declare the entire water body of Eagle Spring Lake to be a slow-no-wake area using his or her discretion when the following conditions may warrant such action:

- a) Water levels exceed 820.52 feet (9.7 Dam gauge) above Mean Sea Level or go below 820.23 feet (9.4 Dam gauge) above Mean Sea Level using the NGVD-29 datum;
- b) When unusual conditions or threats are present in the Lake, such as storm or disaster debris, which present a hazard to boating and recreational interests;
- c) Or when other temporary situations require Slow-No-Wake provisions to protect the shoreline, water control structures, or lake impoundment; or as needed for safe boating, or to assist in emergency response, or maintenance activities.

This declaration shall take immediate effect upon a notice being posted at the Department of Natural Resources Boat Launch and at the Lake District Private Boat Launch and public posting of the order. This order may be enforced using the standard bond schedule for Slow-No-Wake violations and will remain in effect until rescinded by the Chairperson or Acting Chairperson of the Lake District or by majority vote of the Lake District Board.

This ordinance will be published as required.

Enacted this 15<sup>th</sup> day of April, 2015, on motion of Supervisor Davis, Seconded by Supervisor Rasmussen.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 15-05**

#### **AN ORDINANCE TO REQUIRE A REVERSE MOTOR ACTION BY BOAT OPERATORS WHEN THEY ENTER THE CHANNEL GOING SOUTH TO LULU LAKE**

The Town Board of the Town of Eagle enacts this ordinance that requires a boat operator to reverse their motor at the posted sign entering the channel going to Lulu Lake for a sufficient amount of time to ensure that aquatic plants are removed from the propeller before proceeding further.

The penalty for noncompliance will result in a citation of \$75.00 (first offense), \$125.00 (second offense), and \$175.00 for any additional noncompliance.

Enacted this 15<sup>th</sup> day of April, 2015, on motion of Chairman Kwiatkowski, Seconded by Supervisor Davis.

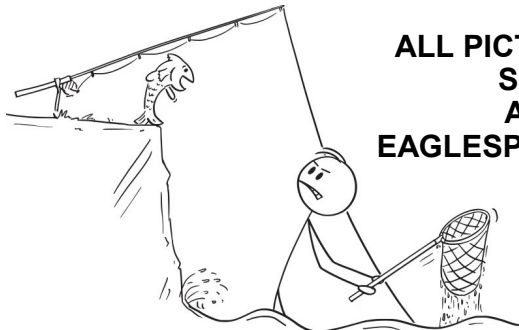
#### Firework Volunteers:
