**Are you Up-To-Speed or Susceptible for A Warning/Ticket?**

Please read carefully and abide by the comments in the adjoining articles on our Lake Patrol/ Ordinances (pages 4, 5 & 6).

**Whats New! A speed limit of 50 mph (maximum) on Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays was recommended by your Eagle Spring Lake Management Board and approved by the Town of Eagle Board, March 2009. Weekdays there are no speed limit restrictions but you still need to not "operate a motor boat or watercraft of any kind with a speed exceeding that which is reasonable and prudent with regard to the conditions", 12.02 (#13).**

Our Lake Patrol welcomes the opportunity to give you a free, no ticket boat inspection and to discuss any questions/concerns/interpretations you have about state/local ordinances. You can contact them when they are on the lake or ask them to get in touch with you by calling the non-emergency dispatch number 363-6434.

Again, this year we are tracking legislation (Senate Bill 12) that would require boats to go slow-no-wake within 100 feet of shorelines. (Note that personal watercraft are now required to go slow-no-wake 200 feet from shorelines.)

There is a local opt out provision in Senate Bill 12 which we will pursue with our Town Board. I anticipate the Senate and Assembly to eventually pass the 100 foot shoreline requirement. Currently the law is 100 feet from buoyed restricted areas or structures such as piers.

**Carp Attack**

In the Lake Water Level article (see page 2), the SEWRPC Environmental Assessment (E.A.) was referenced. Attachments 41 thru 48 of that E.A. provide information on the fishery in Eagle Spring Lake. Of particular interest is the information concerning the DNR's extensive fish studies in 2008. Attachment 48 represents a bar graph size frequency distribution of carp in Eagle Spring Lake and Lulu Lake comparing 2002 and 2008. Based on a catch and release results in 2008, the DNR estimates just over 4000 carp in our two lakes which is a significant increase from previous studies. I want to emphasize at this time that our lakes do not have a serious carp problem, primarily based on two points. One, we do not have a lot of small carp and second our aquatic plants do not reflect disruption by the carp. But, the numbers do appear to be growing so the Eagle Spring Lake Management Board has approved two efforts for 2009 to blunt the carp population.

- We have contracted with Marine Biochemists to electro shock carp this spring, estimated cost of \$500 - \$1,000.
- Two carp will be tagged prior to May 23 and will be worth \$1,000 each if recovered (by any legal means) between May 23 and September 7, 2009. Any legal means would include spearing, bow, hook & line, and netting. Please keep track of the carp you remove from the lake. You can report your efforts to the public boat launch attendants or call 594-3231. Disposal options will be available at a later date.

In summary, the Eagle Spring Lake Management Board felt that we should be proactive before the carp become a problem where more extreme measures would be required.

## Lake Issues

So that I don't spend additional time writing, I may not include some background information that was provided in previous newsletters. If you need more information, please contact Gina for those newsletters or visit our website.

### ◆ Lake Water Levels

We control the water levels at 820.53 to 820.83 feet above the National Geodetic Vertical Datum of 1929 (NGVD - 29) on Eagle Spring Lake. The above equates to 9.4 to 9.7 on the dam gauge. A 1954 reading by the Wisconsin Public Service Commission says we should be approximately 6.5 inches lower (817.3 to 817.6 feet NGVD - 29) or 8.84 to 9.14 feet on our dam gauge.

It has been speculated that the above differences occurred either by some incorrect survey work or, when the dam had repairs made to it in the early 60's, the gauge was incorrectly placed.

The DNR's position has been - lower the water level and our position is - "the current level is where its always been".

State law requires that an Environmental Assessment (E.A.) be completed to evaluate the impacts of maintaining the lake at higher levels (current) than the approved range. So we contracted with Southeastern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission to do the E.A. (\$7,500). The final draft of the E.A. is available on our website for viewing/download.

Very briefly, the E.A. concludes that current water levels have been maintained since at least 1941 and that if the water was lowered by 6.5 inches there would be a loss of 12.6 acres of wetlands. In addition, there may be significant negative impacts as opposed to maintaining current water levels.

I urge you to become familiar with the content of this E.A.! The current status/process of this issue is:

- The DNR is reviewing and may add to the E.A.
- Approximately at the end of March a meeting with the DNR and the Lake District will occur to again review the E.A. (Three previous meetings have occurred).
- A public hearing (your input) will be scheduled end of May, early June.
- A DNR decision, hopefully late summer, early fall.

I have been very brief. Again, I urge you to become familiar with this issue. One additional comment; a significant DNR position has been that if we are to maintain our current water levels, the District must get all (100%) of riparian owners to sign off on flowage easements (a notarized document). Our alternative is to go to court and get a ruling that "prescriptive rights" have precedent and thus don't require flowage easement signatures.

### ◆ Dam Operations - Emergency Spillway Requirements

This is an issue that has taken considerable effort to try to resolve and as with the water level issue, an end may be in sight.

As of November 27, 2007 we have five years to upgrade the capacity of our dam (Wambold Dam and/or Kroll Mill Race on District property) to pass a "500 year" flood event. Our compliance efforts can be found in a Spillway Capacity Report (Ayres and Associates - Revised November 2006). This report documented some conflicting data that was in a previous study (Dam Failure Analysis & Emergency Action Plan - G.A.S. & Associates, January 2001).

On March 4, 2009 representatives from the Lake District, SEWRPC, and DNR met to discuss relevant data from the Environmental Assessment Report, previously mentioned discrepancy data, and the spring, summer 2008 flooding (our ability to "hold back water" to assist the Village of Mukwonago with their efforts to prevent a dam failure) in order to get direction as to what hydrologic data should be used in calculating our Emergency Spillway requirements.

We got that direction! So now:

- Ayres is going to calculate what we need to pass a 500 year flood (by end of March).
- Efforts to clean and replace boards in Kroll Mill Race may occur this spring/summer.
- If needed, costs to replace the gate valve or other modifications to the mill race will be obtained.
- If the costs are "reasonable" the work will be scheduled. Expect an update at the Annual Meeting.

### ◆ Lake Restoration

This title relates to our marl issue and how the resuspension of marl during the summer months adversely affects our water quality, fishery, etc. The following points are based partly on factual scientific information and/or historical perspective/speculation:

- Most of the precipitated marl probably occurred during mid 1980's to mid-to-late 1990's when Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM) growth was at its peak. Now that EWM is pretty much under control through a combination of cutting and 2, 4-D treatments, precipitation of marl may be significantly reduced.
- Boating activity and wind resuspends the marl, however, lower water temperatures and pHs, less than approximately 8.2, result in the marl not staying in the water column as long (one - two days vs. one - two weeks).
- With significant rainfall and increased groundwater flows in 2007 and 2008, better water clarity was noted in our lake during those years. Rainfall and groundwater reduce the water temperature and pH!

## Lake Issues - Continued

### **Lake Restoration Continued**

- Our aquatic plant management practice has been to encourage the proliferation of native species. We have seen an increase in Northern Milfoil, which can be a detriment to slow boat traffic but is very effective in controlling resuspension. Chara, although a fungi, grows at the bottom and Elodea (Jacks Bay) are both effective in controlling resuspension. The acceptance/understanding by lake residents that a healthy aquatic plant community is essential to a healthy lake has also been a significant factor in our recently improved water clarity.

In 2009:

- We will continue to monitor pH, temperature and the influence of rainfall and groundwater.
- We will attempt to determine whether some of our marl has been "flushed" away.
- We submitted a brief summary of our marl issue to the North American Lake Management Society newsletter soliciting responses from their members as to possible solutions.
- And still (on the back burner) with Engineer Dave V., brainstorming will continue as to a centrifugation approach to the removal of marl.

### Eagle Spring Lake Private Sewage System Inspection

#### Pumping Ordinance 2000-01

Some lake residents will be receiving a letter (approximately May - early June) from Waukesha County Department of Parks and Land Use requesting that you have your septic system inspected/pumped this summer. **Please** comply as the "health" of our lake is very dependant on a proper functioning septic system. Our ordinance requires an every two year cycle of inspection/pumping unless you have a seasonal residence. Seasonal residences may have an extended cycle which is agreed to by the Lake District and the County.

If you have any questions about this program please call 594-3231.

#### Evidence of a Malfunctioning Septic System:

- \* Sewage backing up in the basement or drains.
- \* Ponded water or wet areas over the drain field.
- \* Bright green grass over the drain field.
- \* A dense stand of aquatic plants along only your shoreland.
- \* Sewage odors.
- \* Bacteria or nitrate in nearby well water.

## Aquatic Plant Management Plan for 2009

We are scheduling a spring 2, 4-D treatment in Jacks Bay and on the East side of the three center islands this spring, probably May 11 or 12. Restrictions include no swimming for 24 hours and no use of water for watering lawns for 2 weeks. Riparian owners should receive notice of the application for a DNR permit and the actual permit when issued by the DNR. We will be putting signs up prior to the actual treatment, probably May 10.

**Please, all boaters entering Jacks Bay should observe the Eurasian Water Milfoil (EWM) sign at the entrance to the Bay (reverse your motor) so you don't transport fragments into the Bay. There are similar signs (requirements) for going up to Lulu (entering the channel and entering Lulu.**

We are seeing significantly more Northern Milfoil in several areas of our lake. Northern Milfoil is a native species and grows up into the water column in spring/early summer. 2, 4-D can not be used to control its growth. The good news is that it's effective in keeping bottom sediments from resuspension.

A high percentage of our cutting/harvesting is to control the Northern Milfoil which can "clog" your boat prop (at slow speeds). Because our current harvester is nineteen years old, cutting width only 4 - 4½ feet, and with increasing areas of Northern Milfoil we are going to be applying for a 50% matching Wisconsin Waterways Commission grant to replace our current harvester with one that would cut a seven foot width. The approximate cost for the new harvester is \$120,000 and would be available to us in 2010. More specifics on upgrading our harvester needs will be discussed at our Annual Meeting in August.

### Do You Fertilize?

Most pre-mixed (bagged) fertilizers contain phosphorus, a nutrient that lawns often have in adequate supply. More importantly, phosphorus contributes to the over-fertilization of lakes. This leads to an increase in undesirable weeds (Eurasian Water Milfoil) and algae growth. Excess weeds and algae are harmful to fish and make our lake less attractive for swimming, boating, and other activities.

## Lake Patrol - Safety #1 Priority



Again this Spring's Newsletter contains a separate page (pages 5 & 6) for the Town ordinance pertaining to regulations on Eagle Spring Lake. You are encouraged to become familiar with the ordinance (particularly Section 12.02) and **please advise friends, relatives, and renters using our lake** of the "local" regulations. Please observe Ski Channel route - wide turn into channel and "hug" island side to maintain legal distance from pier on main shore.

- ▶ Many times friends or relatives of lake residents are stopped by the Lake Patrol because they're not familiar with the regulations, i.e., **slow-no-wake hours-areas, traffic patterns, life preserver/cushion requirements, and that the certificate of registration must be on all motor boats when in operation.**
- ▶ The "100 foot rule" also applies to those being towed, i.e., skiers, tubers, etc.
- ▶ A frequent complaint **from boaters** is operating too fast in the access channel to Lake Lulu.
- ▶ The Lake Patrol will stop you **only** if they see something that is wrong, for example, you have an expired boat registration sticker. You generally receive these in March or April. Once stopped they have the right and generally will check for safety violations, etc. The DNR can randomly stop and go through a check.
- ▶ In 2008 there were 62 citations issued and approximately 90 written warnings. Your attitude may make the difference as to whether you get a warning or a citation (Be cooperative, polite, and honest!).
- ▶ **Ten Most Common Statewide Boating Violations \***
  1. Failure to provide an adequate number of life jackets.
  2. Personal Watercraft violations.
  3. Operating a boat without a valid certificate of number (begins with "WS").
  4. Local ordinance violation.
  5. Operating a motorboat while under the influence.
  6. Operating a boat in excess of the speed limit or in a prohibited area.
  7. Operating a boat at night without the required lights.
  8. Operating a boat that is towing a water-skier without a required observer.
  9. Failure to display proper registration.
  10. Failure to have certificate of number on board (plastic card titled "Wisconsin Boat Registration Certificate")

- ▶ **This year is the fourth year of the State's mandatory boating education bill and the DNR and our Lake Patrol will be strictly enforcing this law! Persons born on or after 01/01/1989 and at least 16 years of age must have successfully completed a DNR Boating Safety Course and possess a safety certificate issued by the DNR, another state, or Canadian Province. This safety certificate must be carried when operating a motor boat or PWC, no matter what adult, parent, guardian, etc. is aboard the same boat.**
- ▶ Also of importance, Wisconsin Statutes prohibit launching a boat, boat trailer, or boating equipment if there are any aquatic plants or zebra mussels attached.

Hopefully these brief comments will encourage you to spend a few valuable minutes prior to enjoying a safe summer of recreational activities on our lake.

**STATE OF WISCONSIN - TOWN OF EAGLE - WAUKESHA COUNTY  
 ORDINANCE NO. 09-02 - AN ORDINANCE TO REPEAL AND RECREATE ORDINANCE  
 93-02 AND ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR SAFETY AND WELFARE  
 ON AND AROUND EAGLE SPRING LAKE AND ORDINANCE 97-04 AN ORDINANCE  
 REGARDING THE OPERATION OF MOTOR VEHICLES**

WHEREAS, Eagle Spring Lake is heavily used by the residents of the Town of Eagle and visitors to the lake; and

WHEREAS, Eagle Spring Lake provides a home and habitat to natural wildlife,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Town Board of the Town of Eagle repeals and recreates Chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances containing regulations and procedures for enforcement effective on, in and around Eagle Spring Lake:

**12.01 STATUTORY PROVISIONS INCORPORATED**

State boating laws as found in Secs. 30.50 to 30.71, and 30.99 Statutes, as amended from time to time, are adopted by reference.

**12.02 ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS**

1. No person shall swim more than 100 feet from shore without being accompanied by an escort boat.
2. No person shall water ski or surf board from 7:30 p.m. or sunset, whichever is sooner, until 8:30 a.m., the following day.
3. No person shall tow more than three persons at one time whether on skis or surf board and not more than three persons at one time shall be towed behind one boat.
4. No person shall operate a motorboat or watercraft in excess of slow-no-wake between 7:30 p.m. or sunset, whichever is earlier, and sunrise the following day or 8:30 a.m., whichever is later. "Slow-no-wake" means - that speed at which a boat moves as slowly as possible while still maintaining steerage control.
5. All piers and rafts shall be marked by red reflectors of not less than 3 inches in diameter placed not more than 3 feet from the outer limits of any pier.
6. No person shall tow or be towed behind a motorboat unless the person being towed is wearing a life jacket approved by U.S.C.G.
7. Interference with markers prohibited. No person shall, without authority, remove, damage, destroy, moor, or attach any watercraft to any buoy, beacon or marker placed in or on Eagle Spring Lake by the authority of the State of Wisconsin, or the Town of Eagle.
8. No person shall throw or deposit any metal cans, glass bottles, wood, paper or other litter or debris in or on Eagle Spring Lake or the surrounding shoreline.
9. No person shall operate a motor vehicle, defined as every motorized device weighing in excess of 1,000

lbs., upon icebound Eagle Spring Lake, except for the exclusive purpose of shoreline or lake property maintenance or repair.

10. No person shall drive a car recklessly or imprudently on the ice.
11. No person shall operate a motor boat or personal water craft in a clockwise direction around the lake during skiing hours.
12. No person shall obstruct the channel or channel access during skiing hours. The channel is the area between Powers Island and Tuohy's Resort.
13. No person shall operate a motor boat or water craft of any kind with a speed exceeding that which is reasonable and prudent with regard to the conditions. In addition, a maximum speed limit of 50mph has been established for Saturdays, Sundays, and Holidays.

**12.03 RISK AND LIABILITY**

All traffic on the ice bound waters of the lake shall be at the risk of the traveler as set forth in §30.81(3) Statutes. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as rendering the enacting authority liable for any accident to those engaged in permitted traffic while this chapter is in effect.

**12.04 SPECIFIC AREAS DESIGNATED**

The areas shown on the attached map incorporated by reference marked by buoys are designated as areas reserved for that activity at that speed and none other:

Navigation:	N	In:	I

**12.05 BUOY PLACEMENT**

The Lake Management District shall be responsible for placing, maintaining and removing authorized buoys. The buoys shall consist of those shown on the attached map incorporated by reference as follows:

## Town of Eagle Ordinance 09-02 - Continued

### **12.06 PENALTIES**

#### **A. STATE BOATING AND WATER SAFETY LAWS.**

Wisconsin boating penalties as found in s. 30.80, Wis. Stats., and deposits as established in the Uniform Deposit and Bail Schedule are hereby adopted by reference with all references to fines are amended to forfeitures and all references to imprisonment are deleted.

#### **B. LOCAL BOATING LAWS. GENERAL PROVISIONS.**

Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance which is not an adopted state statute shall be subject to a forfeiture of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$50.00 for the first offense within a year and not less than \$50 nor more than \$100 for any subsequent violations within the year. Each motor vehicle violation shall carry a forfeiture of a minimum of \$50 to a maximum of \$1,000 plus assessments and costs as allowed by law. Failure to pay the forfeiture shall subject the violator to up to ninety (90) days in the county jail. The violator shall pay, in addition to the forfeiture, court costs, jail assessment and penalty assessments imposed by law. Each day a violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

#### **C. DEPOSITS REQUIRED.**

1. For all offenses listed in the Uniform Wisconsin Deposit and Bail Schedule for Conservation, Boating, Snowmobile and ATV Violations, the arresting officer shall require the alleged offender to deposit the amount set forth in the schedule **SCHEDULED DEPOSIT**.

##### **a. NON-SCHEDULED DEPOSIT.**

If a deposit schedule has not been established for a specific violation, the arresting officer shall require the alleged offender to deposit the maximum forfeiture permitted by this ordinance plus the penalty assessment, jail assessment fee and court costs, as amended from time to time.

2. If you have been issued a Citation by a Town of Eagle Lake Patrol Officer, you have these choices to handle this Citation:

- A. **PAY** the fine amount on the Citation. You may mail your payment to the Joint Municipal court System or pay the fine at the Joint Municipal Court System before the Court Date.
- B. **APPEAR** in court on the Court Date if you wish a Trial.

**MUST APPEAR** in Court if the Citation is marked "Must Appear". If you do not appear in Court an Arrest Warrant or Driver's License Suspension may be ordered by the Judge.

The back of the pink Citation also explains your choices.

### **12.07 ENFORCEMENT**

#### **A. ENFORCEMENT PROCEDURE**

§§66.14.114, 66.115, 66.119 and 66.12, Wis. Stats. as amended from time to time are adopted and by reference made a part of this Ordinance as if fully set forth herein. Any act required to be performed or prohibited by any statute incorporated by reference is required or prohibited by Ordinance. The Town of Eagle elects to use the citation method of enforcement.

#### **B. ISSUANCE OF CITATIONS**

All sections of this Ordinance shall be enforced by the Lake Patrol Officer or the Town Board's appointed representatives.

### **12.08 OTHER REMEDIES**

Neither this ordinance nor the issuance of a citation shall preclude the Town Board or any Authorized officer from other proceedings.

Enacted this 2<sup>nd</sup> day of March, 2009, on motion of Supervisor Davis, Seconded by Supervisor Malek.
